


# **Tool Donation From Jacobs**

### **Behind The Scenes: Tools In**

#### WHAT HAPPENS IN THE 'TOOLS IN' AREA?

This is the section of our Ipswich centre where tools come in. Vans and other vehicles pull up outside the Refurbishment Centre, and our staff and volunteers work together to empty the vehicles and stack the tools inside by our tools-in bench.

The vans are often completely full of items, so it takes a long time and a lot of help to empty them, especially when we have a heavy footpowered treadle sewing machine on the van. That's a two-person job!

Once the tools have been transferred from vehicle to Refurbishment Centre and have been neatly and safely stacked, our team needs to sort through them.

The first thing that volunteers working on the bench look out for is tools that are in really bad condition. Tools that are very rusty or have a lot of broken parts are obviously unsuitable for us to send to Africa and will need to sent to a recycling centre to be turned into raw material.


Next, tools need to be sorted into categories so that they can go to the correct section of the Refurbishment Centre for refurbishing and packing.

This requires deep knowledge of tools, and volunteers quickly learn what all the tools are used for and what kits they belong to.

We sometimes also get weird and wonderful tools donated to us. The team all try to guess what the tools are used for, but Sheldon, our Refurbishment Centre Apprentice, is usually the one to figure it out (or so he claims!).

Sheldon tells us that the most challenging part of working in this section is making sure that the tools are sorted and moved out of the way in time for the next load.

We usually have at least one van to unload every day, and this is all thanks to our generous supporters who keep sending their tools to us instead of throwing them away!
